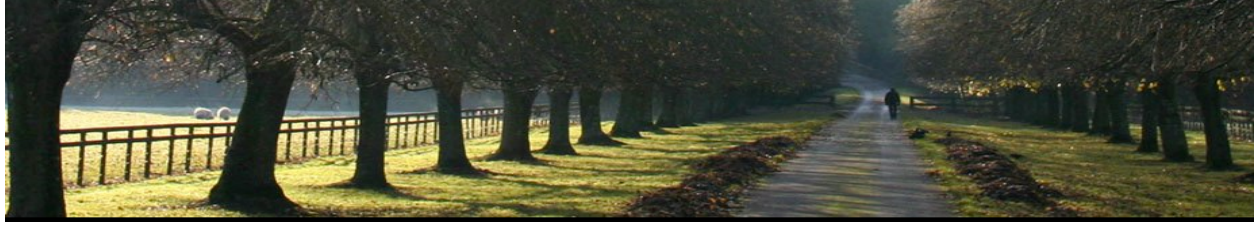


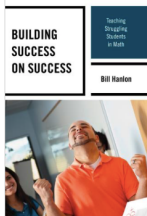
# Nevada Public Education
